HISTORY OF THE ASSOCIATION

The need for an association was identified in 1960 by Professors G M Dreosti and C J B Smit and Messrs L Ginsburg, G G Knock, A M Lewis and J C Schoonens. The initial circular to 150 firms in the South African food industry brought an overwhelmingly positive response. On 7 March 1961, forty-six people at a general meeting held at the University of Cape Town elected the above-mentioned gentlemen, together with Dr L Gorfinkel and Prof. R I Nel to a working group to draft a Constitution.

At the first Annual General Meeting, Prof. Dreosti was elected President and Prof. Nel and Mr Knock as Vice-Presidents. Membership at that time was 95.

The Association grew rapidly with the formation of the Northern Branch in 1962, at the instigation of Mr J P de Wit, and the Natal (now KwaZulu-Natal) Branch on 5 February 1973, after thorough research by Prof. H J H de Muelenaere. The Association now has a current membership of about 1500.

The Association held its first three-day congress in 1970. In the same year it acquired international status when it became a founder member of the International Union of Food Science and Technology (IUFoST).

MISSION STATEMENT

SAAFoST will be the primary regional organisation for food science and technology professionals in business, government and academia through its commitment to:

- advancing food science and related technologies for the supply of safe and wholesome food
- creating, interpreting and disseminating food related scientific information

- providing opportunities for personal and professional development
- upholding professional standards of competence and integrity.

SAAFoST LECTURES, CONGRESSES, SYMPOSIA, WORKSHOPS

Period 2003 - 2005

Approximately 14 Branch evenings were hosted by the Cape branch, including report-backs on SIAL and ANUGA, talks on Risk-Assessment and Probiotics, a whiskey tasting and a successful Year-end function at Kirstenbosch on 1 December 2005. The highlight was the 18th Biennial Congress held from 5 to 7 September 2005 with the theme of "Trend Spotting 2005 - Fashion-Driven Food Science". This was a huge success with 770 delegates attending the various events, which included workshops on products for children and on thermal processing. The workshops were led by two international speakers, namely Bryan Urbick and Art Texeira, both of whom were crowd pullers and ensured that delegates got value for their money. The day after Congress, a Sensory workshop, led by Dr. Herbert Stone (then President of IFT), was also held.

The Northern Branch hosted 30 lecture evenings and factory visits during this time. Topics covered ranged from baking to biotechnology, and from meat to micronisation. Also held were three student evenings, where students from the two local Universities of Technology presented products for awards in a number of categories. In September 2003, a highly successful Biennial Congress was held in Pretoria with the theme: "Food innovations". The Congress attracted numerous international speakers and over 700 delegates. Three post-congress workshops on Dairy, Fruits and Vegetables, and Fats and Oils were well attended. In 2004 the branch hosted a very popular HIV/AIDs Symposium and a successful Pre and Probiotics Symposium was held in November 2005.

The Northern Branch also hosted two national activities, The SAAFoST Expo and The Career Roadshow. 1) The SAAFoST Expo and Talk Shop was held at the CSIR in Pretoria on 14 & 15 Sept 2004. This third event of its kind, featured ten major events over two days: an Exhibition of 28 participants, two "Executive" breakfasts (Food Control Model, SACNASP Registration), two commercial "Talk Shops", four one-day symposia (Flavour Frontiers, Labelling & Legislation, 6th Soyfood Intl., Bio/Chemtek Forum) and a food processing hygienic design workshop. 2) The SAAFoST Food Science and Technology Career Roadshow was a one day event on career issues for about 275 final year food technology and nutrition students presented by thirty five guest speakers at the Durban Institute of Technology, Cape Peninsula University of Technology and the Tshwane University of Technology.

The KwaZulu Natal Branch held a total of 11 branch events during this period. In September 2003 Dr Mark McLellan, President IFT, USA spoke on "Industry -University Partnerships: Form, Function & Success"; August 2004 saw Rolf Uys of AIB International - Food Safety & Quality Management, speak on 'When East meets West... Is South Africa caught somewhere in the middle?'; and during May 2005 various speakers participated in the Food Technology Lecture Series at DIT on: Practical Aspects of Essential Food Components. The annual Food Technology Student Project Presentations also provided local food companies an ideal environment in which to screen and interact with students as prospective in-service trainees.

The three Branches are also very heavily involved in the various university and technikon student presentations and seminars which have been held in association with SAAFoST over many years.

THE ERNEST NEWBERY MEMORIAL LECTURE

This was instituted to honour the memory of the late Ernest Newbery, who was an active and dedicated member of both the Cape and Northern Branches for 25 years. He served five terms as Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Council, was Chairman of the Organising Committee for the first Biennial Congress in Cape Town in 1970, and was elected an Honorary Life Member in 1989. The lecture, the first scientific paper at a biennial congress, is delivered by a prominent and distinguished scientist. The following scientists have delivered the Ernest Newbery Memorial Lecture:

The FACS Website

FACS has been administered by SAAFoST since 2005 and will be financed by the Association in the future. The purpose of the Food Advisory Consumer Service and the website in particular, is to provide relevant and scientifically accurate information on food and nutrition issues to consumers and the media. FACS is run by a committee representing SAAFoST, The Association of Dietetics of South Africa (ADSA) and the South African National Consumer Union (SANCU).

USE OF THE ASSOCIATION’S NAME AND LOGO

No business entity or member may use the name of the Association, it’s logo or the acronym SAAFoST (or SAAFOST) on business/commercial literature or in advertising, or in any way imply SAAFoST endorsement for a product or service without the written consent of the Executive Director or National Secretary. Individual Members are, however, encouraged to use their membership and participation in the Associations events in their *Curriculum Vitae*.

SAAFoST CONTINUING EDUCATION PROGRAMME (CEP)

One of the Association’s professional objectives in the area of education is the provision and formalisation of opportunities for continuing, post graduate, education to ensure that members are kept abreast of new advances. This involves close liaison with academic and other institutions in order to meet required needs and standards for the provision of world class courses and workshops. SAAFoST will evaluate and approve course content and will monitor effectiveness and members’ and industry’s acceptance of the programme, taking corrective action as necessary.

Only those courses that continuously meet specified requirements will be endorsed with the CEP logo. The standard SAAFoST logo used in sanctioning joint ventures or other activities will still be used but is not to be confused with the Continuing Education Logo.

THE KOEPPEN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

To honour the late Professor B H Koeppen, who was Head of the Department of Food Science at the University of Stellenbosch up to his death in 1980, the Council of SAAFoST has made available one postgraduate scholarship, "The Koeppen Memorial Scholarship", valued at R25, 000 per annum.

Names of students registered for Masters or Doctorate degrees in the Departments of Food Science at the Universities of Stellenbosch, Pretoria, or the Free State OR the Departments of Food Technology at the University of Johannesburg, the Durban

Institute of Technology, the Cape Peninsula University of Technology, or the Tshwane University of Technology may be submitted by the respective Department Heads as candidates for this award. The students must be non-working and non-sponsored, be South African citizens and study at a South African tertiary institution. Recommendations based on academic excellence in previous degree results must reach the National Secretary by 28 February each year.

Nomination forms are obtainable from the National Secretary. The Executive Committee of SAAFoST will adjudicate the final selection for the award which will be made at a meeting of the local branch of SAAFoST at a suitable function. Payment will be made to the institution towards the fees.

SAAFoST STUDY GRANTS

The Council of SAAFoST makes available a study grant for each of the Departments of Food Science at the Universities of Stellenbosch, Pretoria, and the Free State and the Departments of Food Technology at the Durban Institute of Technology and the the Cape Peninsula University of Technology, the Tshwane University of Technology and the University of Johannesburg, based on performance and need, to the value of R20, 000 each, for the final year of undergraduate/diplomate study.

The student must be non-working, non-sponsored, a South African citizen and have an undisputed record of academic distinction, *e.g.* over 75% in all subjects for the previous academic years. Recommendations by the Department Heads based on such academic excellence and need must reach the SAAFoST National Secretary by 28 February each year. Nomination forms are obtainable from the National Secretary.

The Executive Committee of SAAFoST will adjudicate the final selection for the awards which will be made at a meeting of the local branch of SAAFoST at a suitable function. Payment will be made to the tertiary institution towards the fees.

SAAFoST ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

The Council of SAAFoST makes available an award of a certificate and an amount of R1000 for the most deserving student for a completed first degree or completed four semesters for a diploma in Food Science/Technology based on the results obtained in the previous year. These awards are available at the following tertiary institutions: University of Pretoria, University of Stellenbosch, University of Johannesburg, University of the Free State, Cape Peninsula University of Technology, Tshwane University of Technology and Durban Institute of Technology

Judging for the award is left to the discretion of the Department Heads of the respective institutions and is based on academic excellence. The names of the students must be submitted by 28 February each year to the National Secretary from whom nomination

forms are obtained. The certificate and prize money will be transferred to the respective branches for distribution

THE INTERNATIONAL UNION OF FOOD SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY(IUFoST)
World Congress Scholarships for Students

To encourage student participation in IUFoST World Congresses, a limited number of student scholarships are made available. Each Adhering Body may nominate one student for a scholarship. The nomination should consist of a letter from the student indicating the extent of need and justification for support, the name of the poster session presentation, a brief curriculum vitae, and an endorsement by the student's Adhering Body (SAAFoST). Papers must be submitted through the IUFoST World Congress poster session abstract submission process. Criteria for selection include acceptance of the nominee's paper for poster presentation, need, and regional distribution. Nominations are due 1 January and must be submitted initially to SAAFoST so that pre-endorsement can be made for forwarding to IUFoST.

SAAFoST STUDENT CHAPTERS

SAAFoST has made provision for Student Chapters to be established at several Universities having food technology and food science departments. These SAAFoST Student Chapters would be run by the students at the various institutions under the guidance of mentors (staff members), and under the auspices of the local SAAFoST Branch Committees on which the Student Chapters would be represented. The Student Chapters would organise lectures and other appropriate activities in line with the overall objectives of SAAFoST.

THE SAAFoST MERITORIOUS AWARDS FOR JOURNALISM

In the interests of promoting public education on food issues, particularly with respect to Food Safety, Food Additives and Food Processing, SAAFoST has established a Meritorious Award for Food Science Journalism to recognise those journalists who adopt a responsible approach and whose reports are objective and scientifically correct and consequently whose work contributes to sound consumer knowledge and understanding of controversial or complex food issues.

Scope

This award embraces reports or articles covering any issue related to Food Science and Technology with the exception of purely nutritional issues which are:

- (i) published in South African newspapers, magazines or periodicals directed at the general public or a section of the public (trade and house magazines are excluded),

(ii) broadcast on South African radio or television.

Only material published or broadcast during the calendar year under consideration and which has not been the recipient of any other award will be eligible.

Entries

Entries may be submitted by any journalist, author, publishing house or media department. Nominations for the award may be made by any member of SAAFoST. In the case where the nomination has been made by a third party the nomination form must be countersigned by the nominee.

Adjudication

The entries and nominations will be adjudicated by a panel consisting of the President, Vice-President, President Elect and three other members appointed by the Executive Committee of the Council. The panel may refer the entry to an expert in the field for evaluation but such expert will not form part of the adjudication panel.

Nature of Award

Two Meritorious Awards are available, one for the electronic media and one for the printed media. They will take the form of a certificate and a cash prize of R 5,000 each. A “Finders” fee of R1,000 will be awarded to each of the finders in the “published” and the “broadcast” categories. If the winning item is submitted by more than one “finder”, the fee will go to the first submission received by the National Secretary. The presentation of the awards will be made annually by the President at a SAAFoST function. The travelling and accommodation expenses of recipients will be met by SAAFoST. The panel may also decide to award Certificates of Excellence to other deserving entrants. No cash prizes apply to the latter.

THE SAAFoST DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

This may be awarded to any person for exceptional service to SAAFoST at the discretion of the Council. The proposal, which may be made by any Professional Member of the Association (in good standing) and seconded by another Professional Member (in good standing) must be motivated in writing and will be circulated with the Agenda papers for discussion and decision at the next Exco Meeting. The award will take the form of a framed certificate signed by the President and will be presented at a National SAAFoST function or, if the recipient is not able to attend this, at a Branch function. The letter of motivation will be held in the SAAFoST archives.

THE SAAFoST PRESIDENT’S AWARD

This award, which was approved by the Council in 2002, is to honour an individual or an organisation that has made a significant contribution towards the achievement of SAAFoST’s vision and mission of advancing food science and related technologies for the supply of safe and wholesome food. The award will be made biennially and both members and non members will be eligible. Nominations may be made by any member and these will be judged by the President. The recipient will receive a magnificent large framed certificate which will be presented at the banquet held during the biennial

Congress.

THE DREOSTI AWARD for CONGRESS RESEARCH PAPERS

From funds donated by the late Professor Guido M Dreosti, a founder member of SAAFoST, an award of R1000 is made for the best oral paper presented at the SAAFoST Biennial Congress. All Congress participants under the age of 35 reporting on actual research in the fields of food science and technology (basic or applied) carried out by them in South Africa will be considered. Review papers or papers delivered by guest speakers do not qualify.

The prize will be given to the presenter of the paper. If there is more than one author it is up to the authors to agree how the prize is to be shared.

Papers for adjudication will be pre-selected by the Congress Organising Committee on the basis of submitted abstracts. Adjudication will be carried out by a confidential panel of four adjudicators under the chairmanship of a suitably qualified person appointed by the Congress Organising Committee Chairman. Authors will not be advised whether their papers have been pre-selected for adjudication and the decision of the adjudication panel is final.

THE GINSBURG AWARD for CONGRESS POSTERS

To honour the late Mr Lazar Ginsburg, a founder member of SAAFoST and pioneer of fruit and vegetable refrigeration, SAAFoST instituted the above award of R1000 for the best poster presented at the SAAFoST Biennial Congress. All Congress participants under the age of 35 reporting on actual research in the fields of food science and technology (basic or applied) carried out by them in South Africa will be considered.

The prize will be given to the presenter of the poster. If there is more than one author it is up to the authors to agree how the prize is to be shared.

Posters for adjudication will be pre-selected by the Congress Organising Committee on the basis of submitted abstracts. Adjudication will be carried out by a confidential panel of four adjudicators under the chairmanship of a suitably qualified person appointed by the Congress Organising Committee Chairman. Authors will not be advised whether their posters have been pre-selected for adjudication and the decision of the adjudication panel is final.

SAAFoST ARCHIVES

Over the years the Association has published a number of proceedings of congresses and symposia as well as other documents. A collection of as many of these as can be traced has been placed in the State Library, Vermeulen Street, Pretoria, and these reference copies are available to both members and the public at large. All documents are indexed by appropriate keywords in the computerised system and, for easy reference, in all cases the acronyms SAAFoST and SAVVoT have been included among the keywords used.

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CLASSES OF MEMBERSHIP

The classification of members is as follows:

- An Honorary Life Member shall be a person who has rendered outstanding service in the advancement of the objects of the Association and is elected by the members at a Biennial General Meeting.
- A Professional Member shall be a person:
 - who qualifies for registration as a natural scientist or science technologist in terms of the Natural Scientific Professions Act 1993 (Act No. 106 of 1993), or
 - who has applied to, and been accepted by, Council as a Professional Member.
- A Member shall be a person who does not qualify for Professional Membership, but who is, or has been, actively engaged, or is interested, in any activity related to food science and technology.
- An Institution Member shall be a company, research institution or other body engaged directly, or indirectly, in food science or technology. An Institution Member shall designate one representative, preferably from its senior scientific or technical personnel, to represent the institution in the Association.
- A Student Member shall be a person who is following a course of technical, practical or scientific training, as approved by the Executive Committee of the Council.

Honorary Life Members and Professional Members shall be Corporate Members, and Institution Members, Members and Student Members shall be non-Corporate Members.

(The relevance of this is that, in terms of the SAAFoST Constitution, only corporate members may nominate, second and vote candidates for President Elect and Vice President. It is a requirement of the constitution that the administration of SAAFoST should be the responsibility of professionally qualified food scientists and technologists or other registered natural scientists).

CUSTODIAN MEMBERS

This is a select group of Institution Members who subscribe to additional principles in promoting and upholding professional standards of competence and integrity in advancing food science and related technologies for the provision of safe and wholesome food. Conditions of membership are as follows:

Conditions

To act with integrity in the business of providing safe and wholesome food for the nation.
To support the food science & technology profession.
To subscribe to the principle of the members’ professional code of conduct, to be a signatory to the code and to display the certificate.

Membership Selection and Fees

The selection will be either by invitation of the Executive Director and Exco or by application. In the latter case, the application would need the approval of the Executive Director and Exco. The annual fee will be set at the Biennial General Meeting and this group will be partners and will be consulted on prioritising special objectives to be achieved by SAAFoST. Such objectives might include projects involving: education, legislation, consumer Information, technical information for industry, *etc.* Custodian Members will receive regular feedback on progress against these objectives and also via a report-back dinner evening every year.

Certificate

Custodian Members will receive a framed certificate and will be entitled to use a specially designed logo and motto: *SAAFoST Custodian - promoting food professionalism in Southern Africa.* (Use of the SAAFoST logo is not permitted.)

CONSULTANTS TO THE FOOD INDUSTRY

SAAFoST offers a service to members and the Food Industry by maintaining a list on its Website of Professional Members of the Association who are available as Consultants to the Food Industry. As a safeguard, only SAAFoST Members who have been Professional Members for at least five years, and who are in good standing with SAAFoST, will be listed. A fee of R136.80 (VAT included) per annum will be levied to consultants who wish to feature on the list. A registration form for consultants who meet these criteria, and who wish to be listed, is available from the SAAFoST website or from the National Secretary.

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The SAAFoST PROFESSIONAL CODE OF CONDUCT

In order to uphold the dignity, standing and reputation of their profession, members of the South African Association for Food Science and Technology (SAAFoST) are required to adhere to the following Professional Code of Conduct. They shall:

1. Have due regard to public safety, public health and well-being.
2. Act in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.
3. Discharge their duties to their employer or client in an efficient manner and with integrity, especially when the information supplied will be used to inform the public on matters of health, nutrition and food safety.
4. Not undertake professional scientific or technological work of such a nature that their education, experience or background has not rendered them competent to perform.
5. Maintain proprietary information in confidence or obtain prior approval of the owner before disclosing such information to third parties.
6. Report all research properly and accurately.
7. Acknowledge the work and publications of others, properly and accurately.
8. Maintain objectivity when reviewing scientific work, publications or journals.
9. Treat all colleagues and co-workers with respect regardless of the individual's race, sex national origin, religion, marital status, veteran status, disability or sexual orientation.
10. Avoid conflicts of interest and if unavoidable, disclose to their client in writing, any substantial interest they may have in any company, firm or person carrying on any contracting, consulting work or manufacturing business which is, or may be, related to the work for which they are employed, as well as particulars of any royalty accruing to them from any articles or process used in, or for the purpose of, the work in respect of which they are employed.
11. Subject to rule 10, not receive either directly or indirectly, any gratuity, commission or other financial benefit in respect of any article or process used in, or for the purpose of, the work in respect of which they are employed, unless such gratuity, commission or other financial benefit has been authorised, in writing, by their employer or client.
12. Not maliciously or recklessly injure, either directly or indirectly, the professional reputation, prospects or business of any other food scientist or technologist.
13. Not knowingly attempt to supplant another food scientist or technologist in a particular engagement after a formal offer has been made to employ the latter.
14. Not advertise their professional services in a self-laudatory manner or one that will demean the profession.
15. Not misrepresent or permit misrepresentation of their own or their associates' academic or professional qualifications nor exaggerate their degree of responsibility for work of a professional nature.
16. Not, without satisfactory reason, destroy calculations or documentary or other evidence required for the verification of their work.
17. Neither personally nor through any other agency, attempt to obtain consulting work by way of touting or bribery.
18. Order their conduct in connection with scientific or technological work outside the Republic of South Africa in accordance with these rules in so far as they are not inconsistent with the law of the country concerned: provided that where there are recognised standards of professional conduct in a country outside the Republic, they shall also adhere to those standards.
